Somaliland - Displacement by drought

Somaliland has two rainy seasons, April – June and October - November. The last rainy season was below average for the fourth consecutive season. The majority of rural communities in Somaliland are nomadic pastoralists. Extreme weather is the biggest threat to pastoralists, with 85% livestock lost in 2017.

Some reports indicate that 9 million livestock have died across the country. The continuing drought has forced communities to move increasingly large distances to seek fresh food for their animals. As a consequence, these communities are now displaced and destitute.

There is a huge need for humanitarian assistance with an estimated 2.6 million people internally displaced across Somalia, of which almost 1.6 million are children. Ongoing drought and conflict have caused IDPs (internally displaced people) to be driven towards urban areas causing overcrowding and pressure on resources and essential services.

During this current response, ShelterBox has already provided aid to 3,468 households. A fourth project is now underway to support a further 980 families
